

Council Update November 2017

Chief Philip Franks

In the last newsletter I went over a number of initiatives that Council has been involved with. You will be able to see more detail in this newsletter about some of the economic initiatives we have been dealing with. However, some additional information and clarification should be provided on economic development and other items.

First and foremost is the issue of Iroquois Cranberry Growers. Much of the equipment has been sold or brought over to Wahta maintenance for possible use. Council stated the closing of the marsh would include maximizing the remaining resources, for example utilizing any berries that did grow throughout the past season. Those berries were sold to Johnston's Cranberry marsh, rather than letting them rot. Subsequent to a notice put out in the newsletter some time ago that any members wishing to lease the ICG beds could indicate so. A community member has stepped up with an expression of interest in running a scaled down version of the marsh. Council is waiting for a proposal from the member and from there would look at lease arrangements for the property.

We have a number of initiatives in the works and do value your input, and we have a duty to provide a safe workplace. Staff people are often the ones doing the leg work on these, bylaw writing for example. It is unfortunate to have to say but there have been incidents where staff are verbally abused by members. They are working for Wahta as a whole, they utilize a consultation process, and are not writing or implementing programs for any hidden agendas. I truly encourage members to contact Council in meetings, phone, or by mail on any subject matter.

The hunting and fishing by law draft has garnered some attention of late. This document will spell out how the conservation of our resources will be handled. William Manary has been contracted to do this work and he continues to look for feedback. Under the current by law there is no specific enforcement body named, it states Wahta will follow provincial regulations. It calls into question how the by law would be enforced. What is proposed is a draft set of regulations pertaining to anyone who has been granted permission to hunt or fish on the territory, these regulations need to be community based. Also proposed is the contracting of MNRF to look into specific complaints with no prejudice to any other activity that is going on. MNRF would be on call to deal with hunters on the territory who have no permission to do so, and not be concerned about any members who have the right to hunt and fish.

Regarding the changes to how a person becomes a citizen of Wahta Mohawks another community meeting was held November 18 to discuss further the basis of a membership code. At issue are questions such as what is the purpose of a membership code, how has the membership changed since 1985, what will Wahta look like in the future. There will likely be two more community meetings on the issue but more importantly our consultants will be reaching out to those who want input but cannot attend meetings. Council is hopeful everyone will consider this matter and provide input when contacted. A target for early 2018 is being set for a draft code to be considered.

Council recently signed a resolution to an agreement in principle to be a partner in a Chiefs of Ontario initiative on Hydro One shares. Basically when selling shares of Hydro one, Ontario set aside 15 million shares for Ontario First Nations to hold collectively. The dividends for the first years would go to paying the cost of the shares, then the First Nations through a limited partnership would benefit from the dividends of the shares directly. There is no cost to Wahta, it remains to be seen at this time whether sufficient interest was shown to meet the 80% participation level of all First Nations.

Once again Nia:wen for reading, we wish all the best to everyone over the holiday season. Look for the next Council update in January 2018.

September 2017 Community Meeting Minutes

Date: Tuesday September 26, 2017

Present: Chief Philip Franks, Councillor Lawrence Schell, Councillor Blaine Commandant, Councillor Teresa Greasley, Councillor Lorie Strength-Fenton and members.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 7:02 pm.

Adoption of the Agenda: Moved by Councillor Greasley, Seconded by Councillor Schell. Carried.

Adoption of Minutes of September 5, 2017: Moved by Councillor Fenton-Strength Seconded by Councillor Commandant. Carried.

New Business:

Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiiyag Child & Family Services (DBCFS) – Family Connections is discontinuing their aboriginal unit. Chief and Council met with DBCFS, they would like to include us in their capital planning to offer services in the band hall building or nearby. The focus is more on a joint relationship with CAS and First Nations working on prevention strategies from a cultural perspective and keeping children in the community. They still—operate under the Child and Family Services Act and do not yet have their own designation which they are still working on. This may improve the relationship with CAS and dealing with children's needs in our community. There will be a written protocol outlining their duties and responsibilities on territory.

Jury Duty – The Attorney general office contacts us regularly for accessing members for jury duty. In the past Chief and Council have not given out the names of our members. A new pilot project in underway to get higher representation of Indigenous peoples on juries which includes a questionnaire and a paid position to collect data. An upcoming meeting will be held.

Archives – Consulted with the archive department in Kahnawake about preserving our documents. Initial costs may be \$20 000 or more for software, licensing and training as well as implementation. This includes retention schedules, scanning and organizing all data.

Duty to Consult – The different Province Ministries do not have consistent policies with how they implement Duty to Consult with First Nations on various topics. There are now draft guidelines and the Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation will be hosting fall sessions. Chief Franks stated it is important for us to have our say in how we are consulted as this has been an issue in the past.

Old Business/ Follow-up:

Peace Process Meetings – More meetings will be held October 6 and 7. Some people felt the format should be more clear that it is to be more inclusive of everyone so there is no set number of people in attendance. Council has expressed this to Ed Conner's, more discussion on this will be held at the next meeting in October.

Ministers Meeting – Minister Zimmer from the Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation did a tour of the ICG Hwy area and Ragged Rapids Road. He did offer the help of his department for funding opportunities and follow up.

September Motion Summary:

09.06.01 – Motion to appoint KPMG as the auditor for Wahta Mohawks fiscal year 2017/2018. Carried by consensus.

og.o6.o1b – Motion to close the bank account of Mohawk Food Processors and dissolveMohawk Food Processors Corporation. Carried by consensus

o9.13.02 - The First Nations Market Housing Fund requires Wahta Mohawks to pay a five-thousand-dollar (\$5000.00) application fee to the Bank of Montreal as required by CMHC and FNMHF. Carried by consensus

Questions/Comments:

Irma White had concerns about outside groups attending the church and felt permission should be made by the community.

Tim Thompson asked about the IESO Hydro project and if the BCR has been made, it will be completed so the project can get underway in 2018.

S Burnett is completing the Small Communities Fund Water Project for the core area as well as the Clean Water Wastewater Fund for upgrades to the Administration Building. Individual water plants in every home may not be practical and would require regular maintenance by every home owner, more information will be forthcoming upon the next S. Burnett meeting.

Peace Process Meetings vs. Citizenship Meetings What's the difference?

This peace process forum facilitates open, inclusive and transparent dialogue between community members that will enable full consideration of diverse opinions and topics that can lead to agreed upon positions that represent the best interests of the Wahta community. In short the peace process is a community discussion about social issues concerning the membership, residents and families of Wahta as a whole.

In contrast the membership meetings will be dealing with the citizenship code and how our membership feels it should change or address the ongoing concerns and shortcomings it has faced within the code for several years.

From time to time issues overlap, we would like to clarify that although the Peace process meetings sometimes discuss issues such as membership and who we are as Mohawk people this is not the same as the citizenship meetings. The peace process is more broad based while the citizenship meetings will address ongoing dialogue specifically involving the citizenship code. The next peace process meeting is December 2. The next citizenship meeting will be in the new year. We hope that you can attend both if possible.

Economic Development

Development Corporation

Work continues in governance issues (what can the Corporation do / not do). Interviews with potential Directors are almost complete. We are still looking for a name and open to ideas??

Rental of Buildings

We have two buildings at the Cranberry marsh site for rent. These are commercial buildings not suitable for residential use. The MFP building has a level loading dock with an office in front and high ceilings in the main part, approx. 2200 sq ft and, the former store is



approx. 1000 sq ft. Both buildings have large parking lots. Please contact me if you are interested in either building for a commercial use.

Cannabis update

A detailed package describing the proposed cannabis greenhouse operation is being prepared and will be sent by mail to all members in the next few days. Have a look at the information and give me a call if you have any questions.

Hwy 400 development

Wahta has received a \$95,000 grant from the Province to do a feasibility study on a service centre complex on Hwy 400. We have retained MNP and Neegan Burnside to determine, 1: if a complex should be built, 2: if it should be built how big and how much would it cost. MNP is looking at the market size and revenue potential and Neegan Burnside is reviewing engineering costs (buildings water and power etc.) It is anticipated that if the project goes forward we would be looking for individuals to own and operate the various retail outlets and that Wahta would be the developer and landlord.

Sign Company

Council has authorized the creation of a company (Wahta Signs Inc.) to develop signage opportunities along Hwy 400. We have had many inquiries regarding the existing ICG signage on the Hwy. Normally the Ministry of Transport (MTO) exercises control of signage along Hwy 400 and it is a difficult process to obtain a permit to build a sign. The MTO controls do not apply on Wahta giving us a unique opportunity to earn income from within that length of the Territory.



Customary Care

Customary care is an important care option for First Nations children who are not able to remain with their immediate family. It is a family-based care model reflective of the culture, values and traditions of the child's parents and community. It recognizes that members of the child's immediate and extended family and community share responsibility in the provision of care to a child, who is or may be in need of protection.

There are two kinds of customary care:

Traditional Customary Care

For First Nations communities, customary care refers to care throughout an individual's lifespan and it is a way of life in which the community takes care of its own members according to its own customs, traditions and standards. Customary care is sanctioned by tribal laws that are indigenous to each Band or First Nations community; tribal laws give Chief and Council the authority to act on behalf of the community in matters related to child and family services. For this reason, the contents of a Customary Care Agreement may vary between each Band or each First Nations community. The mandated child protection agency may or may not be involved in traditional Customary Care Agreements. A traditional Customary Care Agreement may be entered into by a child, the child's parents, the child's Band, or the alternative caregivers who will be providing out-of-home care for the child, pursuant to the Band's customary care declaration.

Formal Customary Care

Where a child protection agency determines that a First Nations child is in need of protection, removal of the child from the parents/caregiver is required and there is a customary care declaration by the Band, the agency may grant a subsidy to the person caring for the child. Formal customary care is recognized as a culturally appropriate placement option for First Nations children, but the child's placement must be supervised by a child protection agency pursuant to the Band declaration and the terms of a signed Customary Care Agreement. This service is provided by the Simcoe Muskoka Family Connexions FNMI protection team and resource team.
