Message on Canada Day

Chief Philip Franks

The issue regarding cancelling Canada Day is something that the population of Canada should come to grips with. Coming to terms with that day just around the corner may be difficult this year. Cancelling Canada Day as a statutory holiday is not likely going to be a reality, however, Canadian citizens of every ethnicity should reconcile the recent revelations in their minds, and if even for a start, not celebrate Canada Day in the usual fashion this year in the light of the first one thousand graves detected at residential schools.

Indigenous people all over the world have been having trying to reconcile the tragic history we have lived with for generations. For us, our relationship began with a trust in the settlers that we could live harmoniously according to the Two Row wampum. This wampum belt signifies the acceptance of the settlers in that we would live our lives and govern ourselves as would they in their lives. As two canoes travelling down a river, neither would attempt to steer the others vessel.

On this issue of Canada Day while Indigenous peoples' wounds have been opened up once again, we can uphold our side of the Two Row. Since people are asking, we can also add counsel to the Canadian public at large.

Clearly it relies on the leadership of Canada to do more than to express sorrow and the promise of money to right the wrongs that have happened. Serious acknowledgement of Canada's true history should be placed on Government websites, and every other possible means of education from now and into the future.

We urge Canadians to hold the government accountable for actions going forward. Canada's current government should be responsible for locating the burial sites that still exist at the residential schools across the country. There have been many governments over the last one hundred and fifty years, they have created laws in this country all throughout, and so this government today should also take responsibility for those laws.

A serious effort to effect justice on the persons and institutions that caused the deaths of children and, held the children with such low regard as to eliminate recognition of their identities, must be carried out.

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission recommendations and calls to action should be acted on. As a result of a class action lawsuit by residential school survivors, in 2008 a commission began with a final report issued at the end of 2015. The Truth and Reconciliation Report detailed what the residential school system actually was. It reflected what those brave people who came out to share, talk about their long withheld trauma, and the report represented what generations prior had experienced.

Recent events should not be regarded as a thing of the past, a part of history. Neglect and abuse were a great part of the saga, but the very concept of taking nations of Indigenous peoples' children from them in order to extinguish their language, culture, and self worth in a bid to gain benefit from lands is a crime that cannot be reversed. Across this country, even today, the generational effects are still evident and being lived out by Indigenous people.

Canada has long been touted as a country that stands for its values of democracy and the protection of human rights on the world stage. Meanwhile, Canada has held dark truths regarding the treatment of Indigenous Nations on these lands.

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission starts with Truth, and that truth can no longer not be denied, it is very clear. Canadians should know and understand their history so that they can reconcile the policies and actions that happened and are engrained in legislation that exists today. Residential school ended is 1996, but its effects shape the world view of many Canadians regard Indigenous people to this very day.

The display of a decision concerning Canada Day will shape what kind of relationship this country will have with the nations of Indigenous people across the land. This is not just about one day. It is about how Canadians view going forward with such a multicultural population, and with what regard Indigenous people will be held in that progression.

Opening and Welcome

Motion 1:

Moved by Lorie Strength-Fenton and seconded by Teresa Greasley to accept the April 27th Public Council Meeting Agenda.

ALL IN FAVOUR CARRIED

Meeting Process

Chief Franks explained how the virtual meeting would be regulated to ensure the meeting runs as smooth as possible. Microphones will be muted, and when someone wants to speak, they must raise their hand or type in the chat. This will help eliminate background noise and minimize the risk of people talking over each other.

General Statement on Public Meetings During COVID-19

Chief Franks updated those present on how Council has been meeting during the past year during the pandemic. Council has been meeting virtually and has felt a disconnect with the community. The meeting information for this current meeting was posted online, although there is some concern about keeping it confined to members only. In the future, Council will use the registration feature to ensure that only members are able to join and participate. Chief Franks shared that he will be providing update on key areas of development that have taken place during the pandemic. He also shared that the weekly Council Meeting Minutes are shared in the monthly newsletter for those who want to stay informed.

Year End Initial Financial Summary

Chief Franks provided a summary of the 2020/21 finances. The annual audit will take place in early June, however the unaudited early figures are positive. There are some ongoing capital projects, and any extraordinary expenses that occur will be drawn from incoming revenue. Both Ontario and Canada have provided COVID-19 Relief Funding. Some funding had to be returned due to COVID-19, and the inability to hold regular programming.

Capital Projects

1. Safe Drinking Water

The community does not have an adequate water supply necessary for a water treatment plant. Council is currently waiting for the final report. Boil Water Advisory has been in place for community owned buildings. The Boil Water Advisory has been lifted at the Administration Building, as a water treatment system has been installed.

2. Community and Administration Building New Roof

The Roof Repair project has been delayed multiple times now due to the COVID-19 lockdowns. The project should be done by the end of the summer, but it depends on the lockdowns. It has also been discovered that the rooftop furnaces have reached the end of their useful life and will need to be replaced. A contractor will be removing the rooftop furnaces, and new ground furnaces will be installed.

3. New Duplexes

The new duplexes on Wahta Road 5 have been completed and were mostly funded by Indigenous Services Canada.

Emergency Control Group Update

Chief Franks informed those present that the Emergency Control Group has been meeting since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, and is comprised of staff, management, the Environmental Health Officer, as well as nurses from First Nation and Inuit Health Branch. The Emergency Control Group has been responsible for developing educational material and watching for new developments. The group generally followed the same emergency measures as Ontario, as well as the recommendations put forward by the Simcoe-Muskoka Health Unit.

Strategic Plan Development

Chief Franks reminded those present of the Future Design School community survey that has been used to create a Strategic Plan and guide Council and the Administration. Senior Administrator, Murray Maracle, explained how the Future Design School Strategic Plan was created from community input and has been used to identify clear priorities. The Strategic Plan focuses on health, public works, infrastructure, economic development, culture, nation

building, education etc. identified strategic objectives have been identified in each of these areas and activities that need to take place to meet those objectives have been identified. These objectives and activities will be used to form the basis of program planning and resource allocation. The Strategic Plan is almost complete, and once it is officially completed, it will be provided to the community in a mailout and online.

Policy Work

1. Council Policies

Council has been working on developing governance policies. These policies are being drawn from work done in the past from other First Nations and various input from the community. These policies are also being done in order to help with the orientation of new Council members. The policies that have been completed so far are: Role and Responsibilities of Council, Roles and Responsibilities of Council Members, Roles and Responsibilities of the Chief, and the Code of Conduct.

2. Education Policy

Education Services Manager, Carol Holmes, provided an update on the changes made in the Post Secondary Education Policy. A Priority 5 group has been added, and is used to identify students who have graduated from two or more programs. When surpluses are identified partway through the year, it is clearly now outlined how they will be managed and how students will be notified to ensure it is consistent. Books and supplies will be only be reimbursed if a surplus is identified in January. Distance Education students will only receive a living allowance during the months when extra living costs occur. A change has also been made to the appeals process, which now allows for appeals and responses to be submitted in writing.

Bill C15: Canada's Response to UNDRIP

Chief Franks updated those present on the C-15 legislation, which is "An Act respecting the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples." This act is concerning to members of AIAI as it will give the government more control and could be detrimental to the lives of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

Census Canada

Chief Franks shared that in the past, First Nations people have not typically participated in the Canada Census. Council will be putting together a statement on whether Wahta will or will not accept the Census. The data from the census is often used for funding purposes, and current numbers are quite outdated. Chief Franks suggests that Wahta does not block the Census in the community, but that no penalties be imposed on those who do not wish to participate.

Ontario First Nations Limited Partnership – Internet Gambling

Chief Franks provided an update on the Ontario First Nation Limited Partnership. This year's gross income is projected to be approximately half of what it has been in the past due to the COVID-19 pandemic and casino closures, however final numbers are not in yet.

Mohawk Language at Secondary School

Chief Franks informed those present about a current issue with the Ministry of Education. The Ministry currently requires each student to complete one French or Indigenous language credit. However, in order for the Indigenous language credit to be counted towards the required language credit to graduate, the student must have taken the Indigenous language at the elementary level. This is a concern as some students may not be able to take two language courses within four years, which may deter students from taking a Mohawk language course at a secondary level. Council strongly disagrees with these requirements and will be sharing their concerns with the Ministry of Education, with the support of the Trillium Lakelands District School Board.

Ontario Provincial Police Detachment Community Boards

Chief Franks informed those present that there is a new concept coming out in Ontario to have more community involvement in each OPP Detachment Boards The boards will have a minimum of five people and take on a variety of roles. They will help to advise the District Commander of the development of the local action plan, determine objectives and priorities for the detachment, and monitor the performance of the Detachment Commander. Chief Franks and Murray will attend a meeting with the Solicitor General's Office on the new detachment boards and Council will have further discussions on the matter.

Land Policies Development

The Additions to Reserve process is still ongoing and is very tedious. Progress is being made, but it is slow. Council received news that the Ontario representative attended the Georgian Bay Township Council Meeting and requested that Wahta obtain the shoreline allowance on McMaster Lake, and they approved it unanimously. Council is looking at how to develop a working document to capture community ideas on land policy development, which is included in the strategic plan. Council would like a group of advisors and a terms of reference to be created in order to capture the needs of the community.

Questions and Answers

• Tim Thompson asked how much COVID-19 Relief funding was received during the 2020/21 fiscal year. Murray explained that the funding was provided in various amounts throughout

- the year, and we do not have an exact number on hand, but he believes it is somewhere between \$400,000 and \$450,000.
- Tim Thompson asked if Council knows how many households on the reserve do not have safe drinking water. Chief Franks responded and said that Council does not have an exact number but expects that a well analysis would have to be done at all houses on reserve to make that determination.
- Tim Thompson asked if land will be designated based on community input, and Councillor Greasley suggests that a Mohawk Council Resolution be created to express what types of land use would be wanted in different areas, and furthermore, which development would not be wanted in the community.

Briefing Note: Green and Inclusive Community Buildings Program, Application for Funding

Capital Assets Manager, Randell Sonmor, and Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, joined Council to present a briefing note on a funding application for the Green and Inclusive Community Buildings Program. Randell informed Council that the Government of Canada recently announced up to \$1.5 billion in federal funding over five years, starting April 1, 2021, to establish the GICB program. The GICB program supports retrofits, repairs or upgrades of

existing publicly accessible community buildings and the construction of new publicly accessible community buildings that serve underserved and high-needs communities across Canada. The program focuses on publicly accessible community buildings (including portions of administration buildings that are utilised by the community). Approval of the application would provide Wahta with the funding to implement 'green' oriented projects (solar panels, replacing old furnaces with energy efficient units to reduce green house gas emissions). In addition, the funding would address known deficiencies (inefficient windows, poor lighting, gym ventilation/outdated bathroom fixtures and kitchen appliances. Chief Franks asked Randell to confirm that the aspects of the projects undertaken prior to funding approval would still be covered once the funding is received. Council was also hoping to have more information on the potential installation of solar panels before approving the application. Further discussion will take place at the next meeting.

Briefing Note: Award of Contract for Supply and Installation of Rooftop Furnaces

Capital Assets Manager, Randell Sonmor, joined Council to present a briefing note on the award of contract for the supply and installation of the new rooftop furnaces. Six contractors initially expressed an interest in this work and were provided the tender package. Due to workload, three declined to submit a bid. Three contractors did submit a bid; Sexton, Carmichael and EEL. EEL had the lowest bid, and Randell suggests that Chief and Council award them the contract. Council agrees to award EEL the contract.

Motion 1:

Moved by Blaine Commandant and seconded by Teresa Greasley to enter into a contract with EEL in the amount of \$219,600 to install the rooftop furnaces at the Administration Building, and to give Senior Administrator, Murray Maracle the authority to sign the contract.

New Round Table for the Council Chambers - Discussion

Councillor Strength-Fenton reached out to Peter Goodwin to inquire about the round table he built for Hiawatha First Nation. He is willing to meet with Chief and Council to discuss potentially designing and making a new table for the Council Chambers. Chief Franks asked Councillor Strength-Fenton to find out approximately how much it would cost for him to build a round table that seats 12 people, and if the price is reasonable, Council will invite him to one of their virtual meetings for discussion.

Renewal of Insurance – Approval to Pay

Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, provided Council with the updated insurance policies for 2021/22 from Mink Insurance for approval to pay. She explained that there is a slight increase in the cost due to the new rental units, and the fact that they were sitting empty. Council agreed to approve the payment, but would like to look into other insurance companies next year.

Motion 3:

Moved by Blaine Commandant and seconded by Teresa Greasley to pay the Mink Insurance invoice in the amount of \$69,641.00.

Indigenous Healing and Wellness Funding Surplus – CR for Approval

Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, provided a cheque requisition for approval to return the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians' Indigenous Healing and Wellness funding from the community wellness worker and mental health programs due to underspending in the amount of \$47,603.24. Joanne explained that AIAI usually allows the money from these programs to be carried over, and that there were challenges spending the money due to the pandemic. Council agreed to approve the return of funding.

Motion 4:

Moved by Lorie Strength-Fenton and seconded by Teresa Greasley to approve the cheque requisition for the reimbursement of \$47,603.24 due to underspending in the community wellness worker and mental health programs.

ALL IN FAVOUR CARRIED

2021-22 Budget Presentation

Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, presented the budgets for each program alongside the department manager. She was joined by Health and Social Services Manager, Christine Cox; Education Services Manager, Carol Holmes; and Capital Assets Manager, Randell Sonmor, and they were able to answer questions and provide clarity on the different program budgets. Joanne made some revisions and will send the updated budgets for approval at the next Council Meeting. At the end of the meeting, Council held an in-camera discussion to review and approve the proposed salary schedule for the 2021-22 budget.

Briefing Note: Follow-up on Green and Accessibility Application

Capital Assets Manager, Randell Sonmor, joined Council to present an updated briefing note on the Green and Inclusive Community Buildings Program application. Infrastructure Canada has confirmed, in writing that costs incurred after April 1st, 2021 are eligible and that the project can proceed prior to the confirmation of funding. Randell has also researched the dimensions

and number of solar panels required at the Administration Building and the Cultural Healing Centre. The Administration Building would require six panels and approximately 13,000 sq feet, and the Cultural Healing Centre would require three panels and approximately 6000 sq feet. Council has asked that these dimensions be further reviewed and confirmed with First Nation Technical Services, but will approve the application be submitted while that further work is explored and confirmed.

Motion 5:

Moved by Blaine Commandant and seconded by Teresa Greasley to approve the submission of the Green and Inclusive Community Buildings Program application for funding.

All Ontario Chief's Conference (AOCC)

Chief Franks informed Council that the Chiefs of Ontario 2021 All Ontario Chiefs Conference (AOCC) is being hosted by Grand Council Treaty #3 and will take place virtually June 15-17, 2021. The election of the Regional Chief will take place during this virtual gathering, with votes cast online on June 16, 2021. Chief Franks also provided a brief summary on each of the candidates.

Gravel Issue

Council would like to begin working on a policy regarding the sale of gravel in order to create more consistency, fairness, and to protect the resource. Murray will work with Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, to put something in place that will ensure gravel is sold to members on territory for personal residential uses only.

Governance Training

Councillor Greasley informed Chief and Council that there is upcoming virtual governance training in August and September. Council will ask that Chief Financial Officer, Joanne Contant, book the training for them, and they are hopeful that newly elected Councillor, Jesse Strength, will have joined Council before the training so he can attend.

Internet – Discussion

Councillor Greasley informed Council of the Universal Broadband Fund, which Wasauksing First Nation used to have high speed fibre internet brought into their community. Council will continue to discuss the different funding available for internet availability in First Nation communities.

Wolf Energy – Approval of Signs on the 400

Murray was contacted by Wolf Energy and the external company they are working with to have Tourism Oriented Directional Signing (TODS) signs installed along the 400 and off ramp where the business is located. They are seeking Council approval for the placement of the signs and will also have a contract in place with the Ministry of Transportation. There was some discussion around whether Council approval was required for this, but given the ongoing jurisdictional issues around the 400 corridor Council felt their involvement was indeed necessary in this approval. Council is in approval of the placement of the signs and have asked Murray to follow-up with Wolf Energy and the external company coordinating the signs to determine in which manner the approval needs to be communicated.

Local Business Support for Charitable Activities – Discussion

Discussion was held on the involvement of local businesses in charitable type activities and the Administration's potential role in supporting these. A local business has requested information from the Administration to assist it with an initiative it is looking to implement. Besides ensuring privacy obligations are respected, the request also involves an activity the Administration typically undertakes each year itself through community program dollars. A discussion was held on how to encourage local businesses to be involved in these types of activities but also ensuring the Administration's role is clear and that all businesses are given an equal opportunity to participate and support these types of initiatives. Council has asked the Administration to work on a policy that balances all these considerations and to bring back a draft for Council to review.

Membership Application – Appeal Request

Council has received a request from an individual looking to appeal their membership application decision. Council will take time to further consider the request and grounds stated for the appeal and revisit the issue at a future Council meeting.

Sand Pit Request - Discussion

A recent request regarding the taking of sand from a pit on community lands was discussed. Council feels it is time to develop a policy that standardizes access to resources on community lands that creates a consistence approach that is also in line with ensuring sustainable practices for resource use on community lands. Site remediation is also another element Council discussed as an element that needs to be consider and potentially incorporate into a future policy. Council will further explore this work and the next steps necessary to initiate it at the next meeting

Muskoka Pride Flag Raising

The Muskoka Pride Committee is requesting to once again to hold a flag raising ceremony at the Administration Building on July 19th at 10:45 am. The ceremony will be kept small and streamed online in order to respect current pandemic restrictions. Council approved the request and will work to ensure they are represented at the small flag raising ceremony. Murray will also ensure the Committee has the necessary support from the Administration that day as well.

Trespass Appeal Request

Council discussed a request by an individual looking to appeal a trespass order placed on them by Council. The Chief will reach out to see if the individual is available for a virtual discussion with Council on Wednesday June 30th, 2021.

Wahta Mohawks offers subsidies for New Construction and Renovations. We also have a subsidy for Water and Sanitation.

- New Construction Housing subsidies are limited to a maximum of \$26, 300.00 each.
- Renovation subsidies are available to a maximum of \$26,300.00 on a 50/50 cost sharing basis.



We have only two of these subsidies available each year so it would mean two housing subsidies, or one housing subsidy and renovation subsidies totaling \$26,300.00 etc.

We also offer a Water and Sanitation subsidy of \$15,000.00 available for two new homes or to assist with the replacement of a well, pump, water system or for septic system renovation.

Accepting Applications for the New Rental Units

The Administration is pleased to announce that applications for the six rental units (four two-bedroom units and two three bedroom units) in the three new duplexes are now being accepted. Each unit comes with five main appliances (refrigerator, oven, dishwasher, washer and dryer).

As with the existing rental units, tenants are responsible for payment of all utilities (propane and electricity) and telephone/TV/Internet service.

We are targeting mid-November to have all the units ready for occupancy.

The rental rate for the two-bedroom unit is \$900/month and for the three-bedroom unit is \$1000/month. A deposit of \$500 is required and will be returned when the unit is vacated if there are no damages beyond normal wear.

As per Wahta Mohawk's Housing Policy, to be **eligible** to apply for a rental unit a person must meet the following eligibility requirements:

- a) Only Members qualify to apply for a Unit
- b) The rental unit must be the primary residence of the Applicant
- c) A Member must be at least eighteen (18) years of age, with the exception of a sixteen (16) or seventeen (17) year old Member who can demonstrate that he or she has withdrawn from parental control.
- d) Applicants must provide evidence of sufficient income to support rental payments and utilities (pay stubs, training allowance, shelter allowance, letter from social services). Applicants who are in Arrears (any account) with Wahta Mohawks will not be considered for housing until the Arrears are paid in full.
- e) Existing Tenants may become eligible to apply for a new allocation in cases where there is overcrowding. Overcrowding refers to a situation where Household Composition exceeds the Canadian National Occupancy Standard.

Pets are not permitted in the rental units.

The Administration's Housing Department will assess all applications based on the criteria set out in Wahta Mohawks Housing Policy.

EDUCATION AND FAMILY SERVICES

In order to best serve our students in a wholistic manner we have restructured our programs to combine the education program, which includes Kanienkeha language programming, with the programs under the umbrella of family services.

Our team consists of Amy Davidson (Family Services), Sarah Chaloux (Language Activator) and myself, Carol Holmes, as Team Lead. We are in the process of hiring an employee who will work within the Education Program. Interviews should happen in the next two weeks. The Family Well Being Program was originally staffed by 4 individuals, and we will be hiring two more team members in the near future.

Our purpose is to continue to meet the goals of the Wahta Mohawks Strategic Plan based on community consultation and programming has been developed from this document. We will be seeking information to evaluate the programs, and welcome suggestions for improvement.

We have been working toward these community goals and will continue to do so. Within the Education program we have exciting language programming (see information in this edition reported by Sarah Chaloux). Through summer zoom programming we are providing opportunities for cultural learning, and we cannot wait until we are given the "green light" to move forward with in person programming. On a side note, we may continue to provide some zoom sessions as this has allowed participants who do not reside close to community to participate. Children's mental health (as well as support for parents) is being addressed and through assessment, individualized counselling and through workshops.

The collaboration and strong partnership with Trillium Lakelands District School Board continues. We are pleased to know the number of self identified students and staff continue to grow as individuals come forward in sharing their identity. We look forward to continued cultural sharing from those who have expressed an interest to do this work and those who may express interest in the future. Mohawk language classes will begin at Bracebridge and Muskoka Lakes Secondary School and we are planning to provide language classes at Glen Orchard Public School in the near future.

There will be many programs offered for children and youth over the summer months via Zoom or other platforms. Our programming staff, Amy Davidson, has developed programs to infuse cultural teachings throughout. TLDSB, Wahta Mohawks and Future Design School is offering programming in partnership again this summer; see advertisement and registration process.

Girls Moon Teaching Workshop Young girls will be offered teachings and will gain a deeper understanding of Rites of Passage from a cultural lens. Teachings on acceptance and respect of their bodies will be emphasized. Due to current Covid restrictions this program will be offered over Zoom. Ages welcomed from 9-16 **Sign up by July 9**th with parental consent under the age of 12.

Traditional Medicine and Essential Oil Workshop Participants aged 6-18 will learn about the health benefits of essential oils and will receive a medicine teaching. This program will occur over Zoom. **Sign up by July 9**th

Arrow Making Workshop participants aged 6-18 years will receive an arrow making kit to be constructed over a Zoom meeting along with a cultural teaching. **Sign up by July 9th limited quantities**.

Recreation Assistance Program. As in person programming is not yet permitted in Wahta we are offering this program for our community and member children and youth aged 3-14 years. We encourage summer participation in recreational activities that are currently being offered in a safe manner. Therefore up to \$100.00 may be reimbursed for registration fees, lessons, and equipment related to an activity that the child is registered in. The receipt to be reimbursed must identify the child's name, and reimbursement payment will be released by cheque only. The parent/guardian must come to the Wahta Cultural Centre to pick up this cheque and sign a form for accountability purposes.

What is Jordan's Principle?

Jordan's Principle is meant to prevent First Nations children from being denied essential services or experiencing delays in receiving them. Different levels of government fund different services for First Nations children, and as a result it can be hard to figure out how to access necessary products, services, and supports. Under Jordan's Principle, we can:

- ✓ Inform families about the resources available for their child and how to access it
- ✓ Coordinate access to products, services, and supports
- ✓ Provide funding when it's needed to make sure products, services, and supports are accessed without delay



A child under the age of majority in their province of residence can access Jordan's Principle, if they permanently reside in Canada, and if the child meets **one** of the following criteria:

- ✓ Child is registered or eligible to be registered under the Indian Act
- ✓ Child has one parent or guardian who is registered/eligible to be registered under the Indian Δct

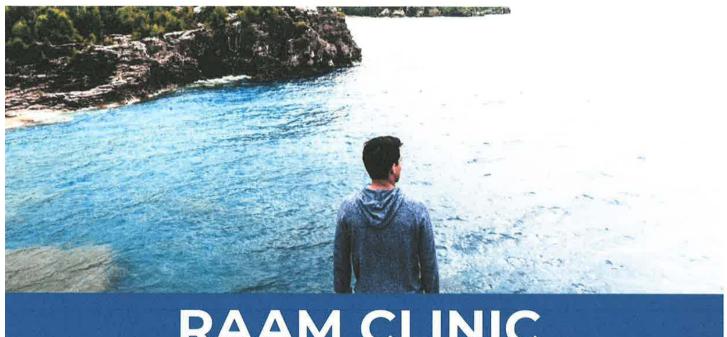
